

New Mexico State University Museum Anthropological Film Series Schedule for October 2009

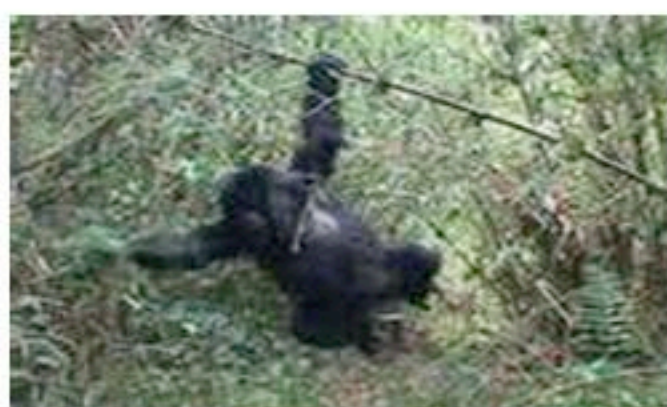

Thursday, October 15, 2009 at 7:00 PM *“The Gorilla King”*



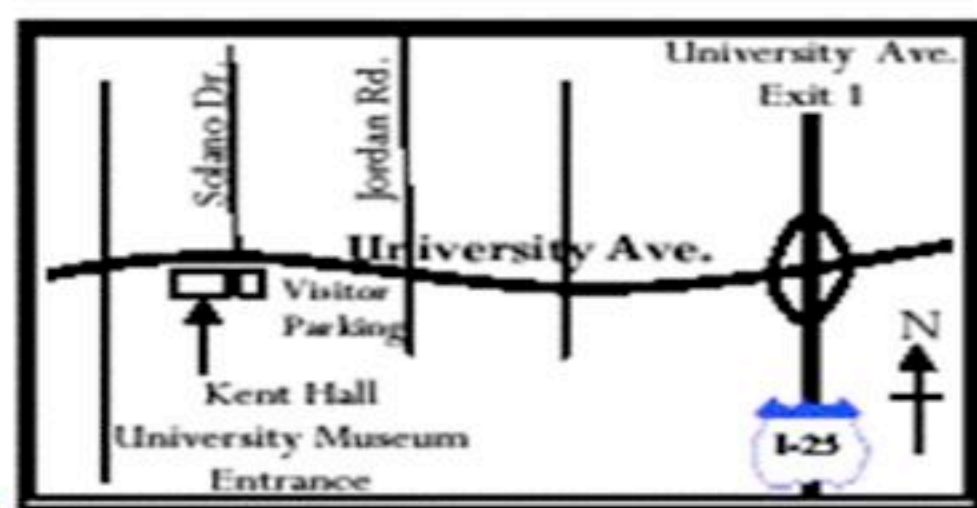
The Gorilla King chronicles the turbulent life story of a male silver-back gorilla named Titus, who was first studied by Dian Fossey and Kelly Stewart in 1974. Follow the story of Titus's life from orphan to ruler and the challenge to his throne today in this astonishing film.

Tuesday, October 20, 2009 at 7:00 PM *“And Starring Pancho Villa As Himself”*

Antonio Banderas delivers a powerful, larger-than-life performance as the title character of this incredible true story of how Mexican Revolutionary, Pancho Villa, allowed a Hollywood crew to film him in battle, altering the course of film and military history in the process.

“Seasons of a Navajo” Thursday, October 29, 2009 at 7:00 PM

Seasons of a Navajo follows the Neboyias family through the four seasons as they travel to each of their hogans engaging in the seasonal practices of shepherding, weaving, planting and harvesting, all of which are central to traditional Navajo culture.
