REGISTRATION - FALL 2008

Admission:

Approval of an admission application is required prior to registration

- **Graduate** students apply at the Graduate School, located in Educational Services Center.
- **Undergraduate** student and non-degree students apply at the Admission Office, located in the Education Services Center.
- **Senior Citizen** students apply at the Admission Office, located in the Education Services Center. Admission to the University is required.

Registration Periods:

Early Registration: April 7, 2008 – August 25, 2008

Late Registration: August 26, 2008 – September 3, 2008 (\$25 late registration fee applies)

Registration Process:

1. Obtain academic advising as scheduled by your academic dean or department.
2. Use the following classification sequence to determine your beginning registration date.
Students, who do not register on their designated date, can register at any time in the remaining classification sequence and registration periods.
3. Reserve a class schedule through MyNMSU or at your academic college. (web access instructions on page viii)
4. Complete your registration. (instruction on page iii)

NOTE: Any student placed on academic suspension during the end of the term grading process will have pre-registered courses for future semesters cancelled and applicable refunds will be made by the Business Office.

FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENT METHODS:

- Paying in full, paying a 10% deposit of tuition and fee costs, receiving financial aid, submitting a third-party billing agreement; or submitting an employee tuition remission authorization.
- Employee tuition remission authorizations (adjustment waivers) will not be accepted after August 14, 2008.
- Deposits are required on courses not covered by staff waivers or third party billing agreements.
- All outstanding qualifying debt not paid in full by the last day to register will automatically be placed on a payment plan and a payment plan fee of \$14.00 will be assessed.
- Outstanding qualifying debt as of September 5, 2008 will be divided into four equal payments due on September 19, October 15th, November 17th, and December 15, 2008.

RESIDENCY

SCHEDULE CHANGES

1. Drop/add forms with instructions for making schedule changes are available at your dean's office or advising center.
2. Any schedule changes may affect your financial obligation to the University.
3. The last day to **ADD** a course or **CHANGE** a grading option is **September 3, 2008**.
- **4. The last day to **DROP** a course (not recorded on academic record) is **September 5, 2008**, (except those carrying a designated date).
5. **Students may not drop their last course via the web after August 20, 2008. Official withdrawal procedures must be completed at the Registrar's Office.**
- **6. The last day to **Withdraw from a course** (except those carrying a designated date) is **October 15, 2008**. The grade of "W" will be recorded on the academic record.

WITHDRAWING FROM THE UNIVERSITY

- **2. The last day to ***WITHDRAW FROM ALL COURSES*** is **November 14, 2008**.

Undergraduate students –may add UNIV 000 for 1-7 hours in the event a course is closed or to complete fulltime status. This course must be dropped by the last day to add for the applicable term.

Graduate students - may add UNIV 999 for 1-7 hours in the event a course is closed or to complete full-time status. This course must be dropped by the last day to add for the applicable term.

POLICY STATEMENTS

Undergraduates who wish to audit or enroll in graduate level courses numbered 500 or higher for undergraduate credit must obtain prior written permission from the instructor and course dean. Enrollment is by petition only and is limited to outstanding undergraduate students.

Registration in College of Business Administration and Economics 500 level courses requires prior consent of the Dean of the College of Business Administration and Economics, or prior admission in regular graduate status by the Graduate School, or prior full acceptance in the MBA program.

CAMPUS HOUSING

On campus housing is obtained by applying directly to the Department of Housing and Residential Life. A \$15.00 application fee and a \$200 prepayment of rent are due at the time of application in single student housing. In Family Housing, a \$15 application fee is due at the time of application; a \$200 damage deposit is due at the time of move in. License agreements, including refund procedures, are administered through the Housing Office and encompass the full academic year. Charges are assessed on a semester basis in single housing, monthly in family housing. Charges are loaded directly onto the student's account. Housing charges listed are for standard sized rooms. Freshmen students choosing campus housing are required to participate in a meal plan.

PAYMENT PLAN and REFUNDS

PAYMENT PLAN

To avoid the possibility of course cancellations, students must complete registration by making payment arrangements with the Business Office by the deadlines indicated in the "Completion of Registration" section. Payment arrangements are made by performing any one of the following:

- Paying in full, paying a 10% deposit of tuition and fee costs, receiving financial aid; submitting a third-party billing agreement; or submitting an employee tuition remission authorization.
- **Staff tuition remission authorizations (adjustment waivers) will not be accepted after August 14, 2008.**
- Deposits are required on courses not covered by staff waivers or third party billing agreements.
- All outstanding qualifying debt not paid in full by the last day to register will automatically will be placed on a payment plan and a payment plan fee of \$14.00 will be assessed.
- Outstanding qualifying debt as of September 5, 2008 will be divided into four equal payments due on September 19, October 15th, November 15 and December 15, 2008.

REFUND OF TUITION AND FEES

Students officially withdrawing or dropping courses during the FALL 2008 semester are eligible to receive a refund as follows:

REFUND PERCENTAGES ARE BASED UPON SEMESTER CHARGES, NOT AMOUNTS PAID. ALL REFUNDS ARE APPLIED TOWARD AMOUNTS OWED.

- The refund schedule above applies when courses are dropped and a tuition adjustment is necessary.
- Refunds for dropped credits will not be issued until after the last day to add a course.
- No refunds will be made on classes of less than five weeks duration.
- Part of Term refunds are based on class days completed.
- In cases of academic or disciplinary suspension, eligibility for refund will depend on the conditions of the suspension and will be entirely at the option of the University.
- Special Fees are refunded in full through the 100% refund period; thereafter, fees are non-refundable.
- Withdrawal refunds are calculated as of the date the withdrawal form is completed with the Registrar's Office.
- Recipients of financial aid grants and loans who drop credits or withdraw may be required to return all or a portion of awarded Title IV funds.
- See Health/Activity billing option area for refunds/charges resulting from schedule changes.

FINANCIAL AID DEFERMENT AND DISBURSEMENT

Students who have Financial Aid and/or Scholarship awards will not be required to make a down payment. The Financial Aid Awards or Scholarships will automatically waive the down payment and pay to Accounts Receivable as long as the student is enrolled at NMSU. If you do not have Financial Aid Awards or Scholarships, you must make a 10% down payment to the Business Office in the Educational Services Building. If a previous semester balance due is owed, a separate authorization may be need to be signed for the Business Office prior to the disbursement. **Students who are enrolled but do not plan on attending must officially withdraw from the University. To officially withdraw please go to the Registrar's Office in the Educational Services Building.**

Any funds remaining, after paying University expenses, will be available to students through the University Account Receivable Office in Educational Services Building.

Financial aid will not pay for UNIV000/UNIV999 courses, audit courses, and undergraduate repeat courses for which the student has received a "C" or better. Financial Aid **might** not pay for courses added after the census date, September 5, 2008.

Students must notify the Office of Student Financial Aid and Scholarship Services of any/all additional resources: scholarships, veteran's benefits, tuition waivers, stipends, WIA, DVR, state or federal program awards, and others which may be received, so as not to jeopardize the financial aid award. All financial aid offers are subject to revision due to changes in policy, law, regulation, errors, or funding. The student is responsible to repay excess funds disbursed due to any of these reasons.

Students receiving loan awards must be enrolled at least halftime and first time borrowers must complete an online Debt Management session at www.nmsu.edu/finaid prior to loan disbursement. Students who receive grants or loans and withdraw or stop attending classes within the first 60% of the semester will be required to repay a portion of aid received, per the Department of Educations return of Title IV regulations.

Students whose financial aid files are incomplete must complete their registrations and make payments according to the University payment plan without assistance of financial aid. Students should visit with their financial aid advisor to review file status and to make arrangements to complete their files. Financial aid cannot be disbursed until a student's file is complete. To avoid delays students should complete their financial aid early and accurately. In addition, satisfactory academic progress will be monitored to determine eligibility for financial aid. Satisfactory academic progress includes: maintaining a cumulative grade average of a 2.0 for undergraduate students, 3.0 for graduate students; satisfactory completion of credit hours attempted; and a maximum time frame to complete degree.
